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MURANGA NORTH PUBLIC PARTICIPATION REPORT.

Introduction

Public participation is the process where individuals, governmental and non-governmental groups influence decision-making in policy, legislation, service delivery, oversight and development matters. It is a two-way interactive process where the duty bearer communicates information in a transparent and timely manner, engages the public in decision making and is responsive and accountable to their needs. The public gets actively involved in the process when the issue at stake relates directly to them.

Public participation is anchored in the constitution of Kenya 2010, It is one of the national principles and values of governance, and one of the key objectives of devolution "...to give powers of self-governance to the people and enhance their participation in the exercise of the powers of the State and in making decisions affecting them" (Article 174c, Constitution of Kenya).

Sections 30 and 92 of the County Government Act 2012 state that the County Governors are responsible for encouraging and facilitating citizen participation in developing policies and plans, providing services, and submitting an annual report to the County Assembly on citizen participation in County Government affairs.

Section 207 of the Public Finance Management Act requires county governments to develop structures, mechanisms, and guidelines for citizen participation. The structures and guidelines should ensure that participation is open to all without discrimination and that there are safeguards in place to prevent one group from dominating the consultations. In accordance with the provisions, According to Section 102 of the CGA, county planning should serve as a foundation for collaboration among county governments, citizens, other stakeholders, and interest groups.

Section 105 makes the County Planning Unit responsible for ensuring meaningful citizen participation in the planning process through a 5-year County Integrated Development Plan (CIDP), as well as other County policy documents such as the County Spatial Plan and Urban Areas Plans.

Rationale for Public Participation

It is constitutionally mandated: Article 174c states that "...to give powers of self-governance to the people and enhance their participation in the exercise of the powers of the State and in making decisions affecting them.

Reduce social exclusion and poverty: traditional planning and budgeting processes can sometimes contribute to social exclusion and poverty due to elite capture, limiting resources available for poor service.Participatory planning could be used to increase the allocation of resources to basic services in the poorest areas by encouraging citizen participation in planning decision-making.

Improve long-term budget allocation efficiency: The County Integrated Development Plan is the most important document outlining the government's priorities.Scarce public resources are frequently wasted on the wrong things or the wrong people.Public participation can improve budget allocation efficiency by developing procedures and avenues that bring the demand side closer to medium-term planning.

Improve democratic practices: Democratic systems are not always flawless. While the budgeting process has an annual decision-making cycle and a continuous execution cycle, governments are primarily held accountable for their decisions during election season. Because of this time lag, elite capture, patronage, and clientelism can flourish. Participatory budgeting can improve democratic practices by strengthening the links between the entire budget process cycle and citizen participation.

Muranga North Public Participation Process

Murang'a County held two public participation forums, one held at ACK Mother's union hall in Muranga town and the other in Karigu-ini hall in Kenol town on 21st October 2022. The members of the public were invited to the forums through various media and platforms such as the Daily Nation, the county website, county social media handles and announcements in churches and mosques. Identification, mapping, and mobilisation of key stakeholders was done through county assembly members and sub-county and ward administrators.

The forum at ACK Mother's Union was targeting residents from the northern part of Murang'a, which included the Sub Counties of Kiharu, Kahuro, Mathioya, and Kangema. The public participation exercise was organised by the County Economic Planning department.

The forum was chaired by the Director of Economic Planning. The director welcomed the members and briefed them on what was entailed in any public participation exercise. He highlighted what was expected from the forum of the day. The plenary sessions were stewarded by the Chief Officer of Agriculture, and also introduced the various officers and stakeholders.

The Nine documents that were presented to the public for their input were:

- 1. County integrated Development Plan 2023-2027
- 2. County annual Development Plan
- 3. County Social Health Insurance Fund
- 4. Murang'a County Health Bill

- 5. Murang'a County Early Childhood Development Regulations 2022
- 6. The Electronic Voucher-Based Farm Inputs Subsidy Policy
- 7. Murang'a County Agricultural Inputs Subsidy Fund Regulations 2022
- 8. Supplementary Budget 1, FY 2022/2023
- 9. Finance Bill 2022

Participants had the opportunity to physically contribute to the proposed policies, The participants were issued with the exercise's program, and copies of the policy documents, and accorded enough time to prepare and submit their responses. Plenary submissions were made as well as typed/handwritten memoranda presented.

Staff from the various anchor departments made the presentations on the documents to the public, after which the public made their observations and remarks. They were captured below.

Proceedings

County Integrated Development Plan (CIDP) 2023-2027 and Annual Development Plan (ADP) 2023-2024.

The Director of Economic Planning informed members of the public on what the preparation of the CIDP and ADP entailed and guided the public on the contents of the CIDP 2023-2027 and ADP 2023-2024. He explained that Sections 102(h), 104(1) and 108 of the County Government Act 2012, require county governments to prepare 5-year County Integrated Development Plans which are the basis for appropriation of funds and provide a framework for planning, budgeting, funding, monitoring and evaluation of programmes and projects in five-year terms. He further informed them that the CIDPs ensure counties' programmes and projects are aligned with the national aspirations as contained in the Kenya Vision 2030 and its Medium-Term Plans.

So far, the First- and Second Generation CIDPs have been developed and implemented between the years 2013 and 2022. The CIDP 2023-2027 which is the third-generation CIDP, adopts a people-centred approach. In the spirit of leaving no one behind, the various stakeholders were encouraged to specify their needs and priorities and propose interventions. They were also encouraged to be involved not only during preparation but also during the implementation of projects, programmes and policies as well as in monitoring and evaluation. He reiterated that the CIDP is implemented through one-year rolling plans (Annual Development Plans) where programme-based budgets are drawn.

The ADP is a one-year plan developed from the CIDP. It outlines what the county intends to achieve within one year, and also reviews the programmes implemented in the past financial year. It provides the basis under which other policies such as the budget are anchored.

The basis for the preparation of the Annual Development Plan (ADP) is stipulated in Article 220 (2) of the Constitution of Kenya 2010, County Governments Act, 2012 sections 104 to 108 and the Public Finance Management Act, 2012 section 126 (1), among other legislations. The plan provides a framework for the prudent allocation of resources to the various development sectors of the County as premised on a public expenditure management framework and with an overarching objective of transformative development agenda.

He went on to highlight the vision of the executive for the Murang'a people. He stated that the governor had proposed to establish a fund that will enrol the less privileged Murang'a residents into the NHIF at a cost to the county. That will entail setting aside funds in the budget and paying the funds into NHIF. He also proposed to establish a fund that gives Ksh 2000 for three months to every expectant mother seeking pre and post-natal services in Muranga public health facilities. The idea is intended to boost maternal healthcare by incentivizing expectant mothers to attend health facilities. The governor also intends to complete stalled facilities and renovate several existing health institutions.

The interventions will focus, on a pilot basis, on Mangoes and milk to ensure that all county ecological zones are covered. These two products can be value-added easily hence creating employment opportunities and a local market. If the pilot works, an extension to many other crops like avocado, coffee, and tea. an input subsidy program for mangoes and milk was also planned. Government can only subsidize the producer to boost production and create employment.

The third pillar of his vision is the community projects program. Projects relating to water, lighting, roads Murram, dispensaries and renovating ECDEs will be catered for under this vision.

The director then proceeded to invite other departments to elaborate more on these documents and visions.

Murang'a County Agricultural Inputs Subsidy Funds Regulations 2022, and the Electronic Voucher Based Farm-Inputs Subsidy Policy.

The Agriculture director informed the public about the relevant subsidy programs the County had formulated. These included Mangoes and Dairy Input subsidies and the Electronic Voucher Based Farm-Inputs Subsidy Policy.

MURANG'A COUNTY DAIRY SUBSIDY FUND REGULATIONS 2022

This regulation may be cited as The Public Finance Management Murang'a County Dairy Subsidy Fund Regulations 2022.

The objects and purposes

The objects and purpose of this regulations are;

a) To establish a centralized Fund into which all the revenues collected pursuant to these regulations shall be paid and administered.

b) Provide for oversight and administration of the Fund.

c) To offer dairy input cash subsidy to dairy farmers delivering their milk to a registered dairy cooperative society aimed at increasing milk productivity and reduction in cost of production while cushioning them from market prices distortion.

d) To spur an increase in usage of farm inputs in the dairy value chain, increase milk deliveries to cooperatives for increased incomes and improved standard of living.

Application of this regulations

This regulation shall apply to farmers registered under the electronic based farm inputs subsidy program meeting specific set criteria as established by the County Government and who are dairy farmers marketing their milk through dairy cooperative societies. It shall be applicable only within the boundaries of Murang'a County.

The electronic vouchers based farm inputs subsidy program

i. The dairy subsidy shall be in the form of an electronic voucher to be leveraged against electronic cash transfer to the beneficiaries that will be redeemable at the specified farm input suppliers;

ii. The program shall target milk farmers based on a criteria to be set by the CEC in charge of department of Agriculture, Livestock, Fisheries, Cooperatives and SMEs of Murang'a

Implementation

i. There shall be a secretariat of four persons seconded by the CECM Agriculture, Livestock, Fisheries, Cooperatives and SMEs to the Fund from the department to assist the committee in implementation of the subsidy. These shall comprise heads of directorates with dairy industry knowledge;

ii. The secretariat will support the committee to be appointed under the Fund in implementing the subsidy program

iii. There shall be a standard form for vetting and registration of beneficiary farmers as shall be appended in these regulations that shall be captured electronically;

iv. There shall be an IT applications developed for efficiency to the implementation of the above program for both direct delivery of subsidy services and as a management information system (MIS) for data management purposes.;

v. The dairy subsidy program shall run for an initial period of time, depending on annual performance;

Priority value chain

i. The priority value chain under this program shall be dairy whose members shall belong to registered cooperative societies;

ii. The above clause (i) notwithstanding, the program may be extended to other crops, livestock and fisheries enterprises or services

Selection of beneficiaries

i. The electronic voucher based farm input subsidy program shall be applicable only to vetted and registered farmers within Murang'a County;

ii. Only persons confirmed to be dairy farmers will be qualified initially for initial piloting purpose;

Monitoring, evaluations and reporting

A monitoring framework shall require to be formulated by the fund manager. A regular monitoring exercise not exceeding once monthly by the seconded secretariat shall be mandatory. Also, a midterm and end year or annual evaluation shall be required to be done by the committee of the fund. All activity reports shall be submitted in time to the Fund manager with summary copy forwarded to the governor once every financial year or as may be demanded.

MURANG'A COUNTY MANGO INPUTS SUBSIDY FUND REGULATIONS 2022

This regulation may be cited as The Public Finance Management (Murang'a County Mango Inputs Subsidy Fund Regulations 2022).

The objects and purposes

The objects and purpose of this regulations are to

a) To establish centralised Fund into which all the revenues collected pursuant to these regulations shall be paid and administered;

b) Provide for oversight and administration of the Fund;

c) To offer input cash subsidy to mangoes farmers delivering raw produce to contracted processors based on volume or weight of marketable mangoes delivered hence enable them increase productivity, facilitate a reduction in cost of production while cushioning them from market prices distortion.

d) To spur an increase in usage of farm inputs in mangoes value chain, increase productivity and farm incomes hence the standard of living of its citizens.

Application of this regulations

This regulation shall apply to farmers registered under the electronic based farm inputs subsidy program meeting specific set criteria as established by the County Government and who are producing mature and marketable mangoes fruits marketed through

contracted processors. It shall be applicable only within the boundaries of Murang'a County.

Implementation

i. There shall be a secretariat of four persons seconded by the CECM Agriculture, Livestock, Fisheries, cooperatives and SMEs to the fund manager from the department to assist the committee in implementation of the electronic farm input subsidy who shall comprise of heads of directorates with knowledge in the enterprises under subsidy.

ii. The secretariat will support the committee to be appointed under the Fund in implementing the farm inputs subsidy program.

iii. There shall be a standard form for both vetting and registration of beneficiary farmers as shall be appended in these regulations that shall be captured electronically.

iv. There shall be IT applications developed for efficiency to the implementation of the above program for both direct delivery of subsidy services and as a management information system (MIS) for data management purposes.

v. The Mango subsidy program shall run for a specified period of time.

Priority value chain

i. The priority value chain under this program shall be mangoes whose members shall belong to registered cooperatives;

ii. The above clause (i) notwithstanding, the program may be extended to other crops enterprises or services

Selection of beneficiaries

i. The electronic voucher based farm input subsidy program shall be applicable only to vetted and registered farmers within Murang'a County.

ii. Only persons confirmed to be either mango farmers will be qualified initially for piloting purposes.

Monitoring, evaluations and reporting

A monitoring framework shall be formulated by the fund manager and regular monitoring exercise not exceeding once monthly by the seconded secretariat shall be mandatory. A midterm and end year or annual evaluation shall be required to be done by the committee of the fund. All activity reports shall be submitted in time to the Fund manager with summary copy forwarded to the governor once every financial year or as may be demanded.

THE ELECTRONIC VOUCHER BASED FARM INPUT SUBSIDY POLICY

In implementing the devolved mandate, the Governor Murang'a County issued the guiding policy statement on the electronic farmer subsidy program for Murang'a County, 2022 to 2032. Over the last decade, farmers have relied on a subsidy system with physical delivery of materials like planting seed, fertilisers and Services like Artificial Insemination that are largely controlled and determined by the Government. As such the farmers have had minimal choices of the inputs that they receive from the County Government. The input delivery system has also been restricted to food crops, ignoring input support to value chains such as the dairy sector, and fruit value chains like Mangoes. It is for that reason the Muranga Government has

introduced the electronic Voucher based input subsidy program that will have the assembly legislative implementation framework. The program will be supported with funds appropriated by the County assembly of Murang'a and the cash shall directly be transmitted to the farmers M-Pesa accounts.

Objective of the Electronic Voucher Based Farm Input Subsidy Policy

The objectives of electronic voucher based farm input subsidy policy is to cushion small scale producers from unstable farm input market prices and therefore spur an increase in their use which in turn is expected to push an upward trend in productivity and for their food security and incomes.

1. To provide for capacity building of e-voucher beneficiaries and process implementers to improve on the delivery and enable a smooth transition from the current physical farm inputs subsidy to e-voucher system;

2. To facilitate transfer of farm inputs subsidy to farmers/ producers of raw materials and service providers' in Murang'a County from physical procurement and delivery of inputs to an electronic mode in the form of e-voucher.

3. To ring-fence the farmer subsidies to only the targeted farm inputs and services through an integrated IT system.

Subsidy Beneficiaries

Only mango and dairy farmers will be initially qualified in this e-subsidy program. Specifically, only marketable fruits from mango farmers delivered to cooperative societies and milk deliveries to cooperative societies shall qualify for the subsidy. The subsidy vouchers will have limited periods of validity and defined values and target inputs per season or the case may be. The subsidy will be implemented county wide.

How will beneficiaries access the fund?

A needs and market assessment proposed to be carried out shall identify parameters under which bench marks shall be set. All the registered farmers shall then be entered into an MIS IT platform and categorized based on their vulnerability to market shocks. To access the subsidy, The farmers will have to market through identified processors from where data shall be available through the MOU and legal contract to qualify for subsidy.

Identification of potential suppliers

The County could carry out a market assessment to identify potential suppliers who are willing to participate in the voucher system and meet the County' requirements. This identification of suppliers could be made through several actions.

Quality control of inputs

In order to achieve the objectives of voucher subsidy, it is critical to ensure that the inputs available to beneficiaries that meet certain minimum quality standards. The County government shall ensure compliance to quality standards.

Value of the voucher

The value of the voucher will be pegged on quantities of milk and mangoes delivered to respective cooperatives by individual farmers. A Kilogram of milk and a Kilogram of mangoes will be subsidized at Ksh 5.

Members reactions and proposals

The members applauded the policies but made the following observations:

- I. There should be a subsidy on coffee and a more reliable, better priced market for coffee.
- II. The County should provide affordable dairy inputs products and thorough quality control checks should be done since there are a lot of counterfeit products in the market.
- III. The County Government should register dairy and mango producers electronically and then put them in an umbrella cooperative rather than leaving it to them as many would be left behind.
- IV. Muranga residents should be more actively involved in the selection of farm inputs that should be subsidized.
- V. Specify the minimum quantities that individuals can supply to cooperatives to reduce the possibility of leaving out small-scale farmers.
- VI. Identify the crops women have access or control to so as to have a direct impact on different households and to empower women in agriculture by including crops such as arrow roots in the subsidy.
- VII. Inclusion of women in the committee that are established to oversee the subsidy policy.
- VIII. The director veterinary services addressed the issue on dairy inputs, saying the county has a plan to manufacture its own dairy inputs to cope with the challenge of counterfeit products.

Murang'a County Early Childhood Development Regulations 2022.

The Murang'a County Early Child Development Regulations, 2022, proposes to bring to life the "Right to quality early child education" enshrined in the Chapter 4 Constitution, and further, The Early Child Education Act 2021 (Clause 5). It is spirited to domesticate strategies towards the rights of every child and in so doing create adequate capacity for every child to be introduced into quality and accessible early learning within the prevailing social-economic circumstances.

Functions of Murang'a County Early Child Development Board

The inter-Sectoral Coordination Framework regarding implementation of early childhood education and development will be shared across various departments and other non-governmental stakeholders.

Establishment of The Murang'a County Early Child Development Fund

The National Government and Murang'a County Government have established Policies regarding Early Child Development agenda. These include;

- Development of Policies and necessary legislation to meet changing Macro environment challenges
- Construction of educational facilities, classrooms and extracurricular activities
- Design, development and promotion of talent development
- Hiring, training, motivating and developing of ECD teaching fraternity
- Licensing and inspection of ECD schools and management
- Integrating ECD to the Ministry of Education Information System

In order to execute the mandate of The Murang'a County Early Child Development Board, the Cabinet Executive Member for the time being responsible for Finance shall create a Fund to be called the Murang'a County Early Child Development Fund. The purpose of the Fund is to finance special programs or tactical interventions by mobilising resources from multiple sources that include monies appropriated by Murang'a County Assembly for ECD feeding programme and designated as "special programmes", conditional grants to Murang'a County Government from the National Government to cater for the additional responsibilities arising from implementation of early childhood education and development, and designated as "special programmes", grants, donations, bequests or other gifts made to the Fund by development partners and/or NGO's and designated as "special programmes", monies from any other source approved by the County Executive Committee Member for Finance

The county director of education presented on Early Childhood Development. She said that the County is introducing a feeding program to children where they will be provided with porridge while in school and a supply of adequate nutritious meals to enhance their learning. The county is expected to employ more ECDE teachers to cater for the increased need of teachers to children with special needs. A long- term care facilities for children will be established and a conducive environment for the provision of ECDE learning through the improvement of the buildings.

Various members proposed some motions which include;

a) Introduction of talent nurturing activities such as drama festivals and athletics.

- b) Motivation to ECDE teachers.
- c) Payment of ECDE teachers on time.
- d) Filling the gaps of ECDE teachers with interns.

e) Employment of ECDE teachers on permanent and pensionable basis and pay them according to qualifications.

f) Improve both teachers working conditions and structural infrastructure.

g) NSSF/NHIF contributions to ECDE teachers.

A Memoranda submitted to Murang'a County Government proposed on the followin amendment on the Early Child Development Regulations,2022;

The memoranda pointed out a few areas in the regulations as follows:

1. A check on the structure;

- There was concern if the regulations should have a table of content.
- There was a concern whether they should include the LEGAL NOTICE NO..., The Early Childhood Education Act (No.3 of 2021) and the Public Finance Management Act (No. 18 of 2012), in that format at the start of the regulation, or should they be acknowledged as guiding legislation.
- Proposed the title of the regulation to read different- "Childhood" in place of "child"
- There was a concern on the suitable guiding act, PFMA (National or Murang'a), or the early childhood education act (National)?
- Proposed title, the Public Finance Act to be deleted, instead have a long title on the regulations.
- Proposed specifications on the articles under chapter 4 that address the children (article 5, article 43).

2. Under interpretation; Proposed that interpretation be under regulation 2. Better definition of child.

3. Establishment and functions of Murang'a County Early Child Development Board. Proposed that regulations 3,4,5, and 6, should not be in the regulation.

4. Membership of the Board. A proposal that the representation should be a female as they are the ones that interact with their children more.

5. Purposes of the regulations. Proposed a more specific and clear purposes and objectives, such as;

- Childcare facilities with skilled personnel.
- Focus on the health welfare of the children.
- Quality childcare facilities following set standards.

6. Interministerial collaborations. Proposed the whole regulation to be deleted, and any relevant functions to be combined with the functions of the board under regulation 8.

Health sector policies

The County Health Policy

Muranga County Health Policy planned for the period 2022-2027 provides direction and ensures significant improvement in the overall status of health in murang'a county. The policy is aimed at guiding matters such as waivers, promoting access to primary health care within the meaning of Article 43 of CoK; rejuvenating the Community Health Services and establish a vibrant Community Health System that is alive to the needs of the residents; Establishing a Social Health Insurance Scheme that focuses on assisting the indigents and Pregnant Mothers access to Universal Health Coverage and related benefits such as the Last Expense.

In addition, it aims to provide a framework for identifying and selecting the beneficiaries of the County Government-Funded insurance schemes; Establishing the policy framework for collaboration with the NHIF in ensuring that the County is well guided towards the realization of Universal Health Coverage; Establishing a mechanism of supporting young mothers two months of prior delivery and one month after delivery and providing a policy framework for the compensation by stipends of the Community Health Volunteers.

The Muranga County Health Bill 2022

The Muranga County Health Bill 2022 was proposed to the County Assembly of Muranga to provide for regulation of health care services in the County, provide for establishment of a health services fund, provide for human resources and training, provide for research in health and to promote attainment of health care service delivery and for connected and incidental purposes;

The act is aimed at providing a framework for service delivery of health care, establishing health systems, ambulance services, facilities such as pharmacies and community health services. The bill will also lay a foundation for a fund to operationalise universal health coverage. In addition, it provides for the training of staff and the use of research to make health services better. all that will be the overall aim of makeing access to healcare affordable, quality and comprehensive to the residents of muranga county.

The Murang'a Social Health Insurance Fund

The Social Health Insurance Fund is a fund established by the county government for purpose of proving a medical insurance cover fo the most indigent population in the county, and pregnant mothers to cover their transport during the visits for clinics

The Fund will be financed through monies appropriated by the County Assembly, capitation received from the National Hospital Insurance Fund (NHIF) in and reimbursements which shall be requisitioned from the County Revenue Fund Account into the Fund Account; grants, loans, donations, subscriptions, bequests or other gifts made to the Fund; monies from any other source approved by the County Executive Committee Member for Finance and Economic Planning.

The initial capital of the Fund shall be 170 million in the budget for Financial Year 2022/2023

Remarks on the The County Health Policy, the Muranga County Health Bill 2022, and the Murang'a Social Health Insurance Fund.

The members made comments on the three documents wholesomely, which we highlight here:

- Members suggested that the social health security fund should substitute the NHIF for orphans and guardians living with orphans (people unable to pay NHIF) as well as incorporate people living with disabilities.
- There was a call for hospitals to stock up all medical commodities and have running facilities
- The county government was also encouraged to come up with ways to improve the motivation of medical staff as it also has a direct link with service delivery and integrity.
- Members also stressed that due to absenteeism in government facilities, employees to choose to remain in government service or quit and run private facilities
- Members encouraged health workers to be time conscious.
- Reshuffle all stuff dealing with drugs administration and put up a policy that no staff dealing with drug administration should be allowed to run private chemists and clinics
- Members also suggested the incorporation of a more robust program for mental health issues in the society. Members also mentioned issues to deal with drug abuse and insufficient parental guidance as some of the themes contributing to mental health challenges among the youth.
- There were calls to closely regulate chemists on the variety of medicine they offer to the public as some medicines were being abused by the youth, while some chemists sold substandard medicine.
- Offer stipend to CHV's in order to reach our communities and prevent diseases.
- There were calls to educate the masses on preventive measures as their effects had been witnessed during the response to the covid-19 pandemic.

Financial Policies

Finance Bill 2022

Finance Bill 2022 is a legislative bill proposing the Imposition or variation of various Taxes, Licences, Rates, Rents, Fees and other service charges, and other revenue raising measures for services. It was prepared by the county for every financial year according to intended targets and prospects for that year. Fees and charges are listed in schedules as follows:

- First schedule Advertisement charges
- Second Schedule Agricultural produce charges, permits and cess
- Third Schedule Transport cess
- Fourth schedule Public health charges
- Fifth schedule Trade-Weights and measures charges
- Sixth schedule Land, Housing and physical planning fees
- Seventh schedule Finance and economic planning charges
- Eighth schedule Traffic and parking fees and charges
- Ninth schedule Alcoholic licences
- Tenth schedule Trading Licence
- Eleventh Schedule Firefighting fees and charges

The supplementary budget 2022-2023

The supplementary budget 2022-2023 is a request for additional funds or a transfer by ministries and departments during the course of the financial year. It is presented to parliament which votes to either pass or reject it. The request is to appropriate funds for a variety of reasons including the need to;

- a. Meet additional costs
- b. Cater for financial emerging needs for which no amount was appropriated in the budget.
- c. Adjust budget allocations when additional revenue is realised.
- d. Reduce allocations when revenue collection falls short on target.

The Kenya Constitution 2010 provides that, after approval of the annual estimates, an Appropriation Bill is introduced in the County assembly for approval and assent by the governor. In addition, there is the equalisation Appropriation Bill that authorises allocations of funds from the equalisation Fund for marginal areas, in line with the constitution.

A presentation was made to the members highlighting the proposed finance bill and made their reactions as captured below.

The chief officer for Revenue presented to the members on the finance bill and they raised the following remarks:

- The boda-boda riders express their willingness to contribute to the county's development through taxes, but made the remarks that the fees and licences should be revised downwards.
- A member raised an issue on licensing of agrovets where foodstuffs and agrovet
- products were being sold in the same shop.
- Members noted that there are too many liquor shops licensing which had contributed to the drug addiction issues especially among the youth.
- Members expressed their discontent on the long procedure on change of user process for land.
- Members from Kiriaini town encouraged the government to do more field visits to the town to solve a myriad of issues in that town:
 - Lack of properly marked designated and developed parking spaces.
 - Lack of designated areas for hawkers
 - Poorly paved roads and walkways
- Members expressed their concern that the Mukuyu stage was occupied by miraa sellers instead of passengers waiting to board matatus.
- Funding Murang'a sewerage and water projects in areas like St Mary's and Kambirwa
- requires a more robust water and sewerage system.
- Constitution of County Budget Economic Forum.

CHALLENGES, RECOMMENDATIONS AND CONCLUSION

Introduction

This chapter provides a summary of challenges encountered during the public participation process, recommendations and conclusion.

Challenges

- 1. The members of the public encouraged that in future, public participation is conducted at a lower level such as ward or sub county since most residents were not able to travel to the appointed venues.
- 2. There was a low level of youth turnout in the public engagement process. The youth requested payment and sitting allowances before the process took place.
- 3. Development initiatives in the past are being implemented slowly. As a result, public trust in the county administration was gradually declining and the public communicated that fact. It was therefore challenging for them to initially participate in the process
- 4. A lack of community capacity for participatory budgeting and planning as well as the duties of each level of government, as well as high levels of illiteracy. Many members were not aware of which functions belong to which level of government.

Recommendations

1. To educate community members on their roles and obligations under the decentralised system of governance, regular and focused civic education needs to be conducted. Additionally, community forums might be organised every three months in each ward to educate and invite feedback from the locals.

community opinion regarding the county government's accessibility, cost, and service quality.

- 2. To prevent money wastage, duplication, or channelling from different sources to one project without organised negotiation on project finance, it is necessary to coordinate county government programs with those of other development stakeholders.
- 3. There needs to be a plan in place to enable better and more fruitful youth involvement in upcoming county budgets. In order to ensure that this goal is achieved, the pertinent line ministry and county planning unit.
- 4. To maintain early, on-time plan preparation and deadlines and to enhance the budget process. The financial constraints and legal deadlines should be followed by other institutions as well.
- 5. There is a need to improve social budgeting, public participation, and the inclusion of specific group needs such as that of women, adolescents, and persons with disabilities, as well as the increasing realisation of human rights in the country.
- 6. The projects should be distributed evenly across each ward to create complete ownership and even growth within each ward.

Conclusion

Only when public concerns are considered during decision-making processes will effective public participation be realised. It requires the concerted and collaborative efforts of the national government, county governments, political leaders, religious leaders, youth leaders, women leaders, special groups leaders and community leaders to succeed. When the issue at stake is directly relevant to them, the public becomes intimately involved in the public participation process.

Furthermore, when public participation occurs, all stakeholders easily collaborate to implement the decisions made.

To summarise, effective public participation contributes to the recognition of communities' rights to manage their own affairs and to advance their development. This results in shared prosperity and socioeconomic transformation.
